Answer: 1♣

We show our four card major. This bid of a new suit is a wide ranging bid, anything from 6 to 17+HCP.

Answer: 1♥

We have 13 HCP (a strong responder hand) but our bid of a new suit is forcing. Partner must bid again. We can show our strength with our rebid.

Answer: 2

We satisfy the Rule of 14 (9 HCP + 7 hearts = 16) so can bid at the 2-level

Answer: 14

We have 14 HCP, a strong responder's hand. We have enough strength for game but in which contract? We bid spades at the lowest level to leave room to find the best resting place. 1♠ is a wide ranging bid showing anything from 6-17+ HCP. Partner must not pass a bid of a new suit. We can show our great strength on our next bid.

Answer: 2♥

We start with a forcing response at the lowest level. Although we only have 7 high card points the hand passes the 'Rule of 14' (7 HCP + 7 hearts= 14), so we can make a change of suit response at the 2 level.

Answer: 1NT

The Dustbin 1NT. All this bid shows is a hand with 6-9 points, any shape. Opener might have 19 points, and game might be possible. We must not pass with 6 points. This is the only natural No Trump bid that does not promise a balanced hand/

Answer: 1NT

We have a balanced hand. With 16 HCP we were too strong to open 1NT but we must now limit our hand and show our shape by rebidding 1NT (15-16 HCP balanced). Partner is now well placed to determine the best contract.

Answer: 3NT

Partner has not supported our hearts and his bid denies four spades so we now think about a No Trump contract. We have 17 HCP and partner has bid at the 2-level so has 19+ points. We have enough for game (25+) so we bid 3NT. We must not bid 2NT – partner might pass.

Answer: 2NT

With 15-15 HCP we would have rebid 1NT, but with 17 HCP we must JUMP in No Trumps.

Answer: 3♣

We have a fit in spades so we know this by bidding spades. This sets the contract as being in spades. The question is – at what level? With 12-15 points we would bid just 2♠, but with 16 pointys we need to show our 'intermediate' strength by JUMPING to 3♠.

Answer: 2♥

With minimum opening points a rebid at the lowest level is correct. This repeating of our suit is a limit bid, promising 12-15 points, at least 5 hearts, and denies holding four spades.

Answer: 2♣

We have an intermediate strength opener's hand and we have to rebid our clubs. With 16-18 HCP and a good 6 card suit we can bid 3. This repeat of our suit is a limit bid, denying a balanced hand and denying four spades
